Familiar Faces: Tracy Joyce

A lot of work goes on behind the scenes to make Wiscasset Public Library a great community resource. We like to introduce community members who contribute to our success. This month, meet Library Newsletter Editor, **Tracy Joyce**:

Staff Picks: Recommended Books by Pamela Dunning

Get ready for Maine's Bicentennial in 2020. Delve into the state's history by reading one of these Maine biographies and autobiographies, available here at WPL:

A Surgeon's Fight to Rebuild Men by Fred Albee is the autobiography of one of the great surgeons of all time. Even his contemporaries considered him a miracle man.

A Midwife's Tale: The Life of Martha Ballard Based on Her Diary, 1785-1812 by Laurel Thatcher Ulrich clearly portrays the hardships and the joys of early medicine. She also provides a look at the ordinary life in preindustrial America.

The Baxters of Maine: Downeast Visionaries by Neil Rolde follows two men – a father and son – who created and through their lives continued to build the state park system.

Joshua Chamberlain: A Hero's Life & Legacy by John J. Pullen details Chamberlain's contribution to fighting during the Civil War, his work as Governor of the state of Maine and his 12 years as President of Bowdoin College.

Jonathan Fischer: Maine Parson 1768-1847 by Mary Ellen Chase is an engrossing and humorous account of the life of a farmer, a missionary, an artist, a parson and more.

My World Is An Island by Elisabeth Ogilvie is the author's story of moving to a small island and all of the challenges that were overcome. Reviewers call this "a happy story of a funny island..." and "an inspiring book about life simpler and more beautiful than most of us know."

Margaret Chase Smith: Beyond Convention by Patricia Schmidt follows the remarkable path of Smith's political career, starting in the House of Representatives, then the Maine Senate and her run for President in 1964. It also illuminates the private life of this public figure.



Brownstone Book Fund — THANK YOU!

The WPL Children's Room has received a wonderful gift of 100 children's books. The books were donated to the library by the Brownstone Book Fund, a private foundation based in New York City, according to Children's Librarian Laurie Ridgway. The library was chosen to receive the donation due to a lucky encounter for Library patron Linda Belmont.



You may know Linda from her volunteer work at Wiscasset Elementary School. Linda has been a longtime advocate for early childhood literacy. While traveling last year, she had the good fortune to meet Diane Brownstone. Diane very generously offered to provide books to our local library. The Brownstone Book Fund fosters a love of reading and books in children, and encourages children and parents to read together. The fund, founded in 1997 by Clyde and Diane Brownstone, donates 100 books to 100 libraries across the country each year.

The donation consists of high quality, library-bound hardcover books for pre-kindergarten through early readers. There are a number of classics such as *Eloise*, *The Snowy Day* and *Mike Mulligan and His Steam Shovel*, along with current favorites such as *Dewey: There's a Cat in the Library*, *Duck on a Tractor* and *My Grandfather's Coat*. Your library card gives you access to more than 11,000 eBooks and 8,000 eAudiobooks. The **cloudLibrary™** app allows you to borrow and read, or listen, for free. This app includes a fully functional reader which lets you to read an eBook directly in the app, as well as bookmark and save the position of the book across devices. It also includes an Audiobook player, allowing you to download, play and listen to books offline. Follow the cloudLibrary link on the library homepage to see all that WPL offers. When you open the cloudLibrary page, you will find a "Download App" button in the top right corner. The app is very intuitive but feel free to ask a Librarian for assistance if you need help.
