Meticulously researched, this book reveals the agonizing wait for news of what happened to their loved ones aboard and tells the stories of passengers from their boarding to the sinking, rescue, and arrival back in the country, and, for those who did not survive, their final coming ashore in Nova Scotia. It's a unique and fascinating addition to the Titanic story and to Maine history.

The content of the Large Print books is the same as the regular print books – it is just easier to read if your vision is not 20/20. FOR KIDS (BIRTH—SCHOOL AGE)

**GOAL**: To keep our kids excited about reading during the school break so they do not suffer *summer slide*.\*

**Sign-up** begins June 11 and runs through the end of July, ending 7/31. **Reporting** begins July 2 and ends August 13.

### FOR BABIES & TODDLERS: Read to Me Program.



Read 20 books to your child, listing the title and author. Turn in your list and receive a gift bag that includes a board book and an invitation to the Summer Reading Club Celebration pool party\*\*.

### FOR GRADES PRE-K THROUGH GRADE 6 OR AGES 4—11: Read 6 books. Reporting begins Tuesday, July 2.

For long books, every 100 pages count as 1 book. 2 graphic novels count as one book. All forms of books and reading count including eBooks & audio books. Book review forms are available at the Library. Children too young to write should receive help from caregivers or the Librarian. For each of the first 6 books, you will receive an incentive. Your 6th book review also earns a raffle ticket and an invitation to the Summer Reading Club Celebration pool party\*\*. Raffle prizes include the American Girl Doll "Luciana Vega" with her own astronaut suit or a Lunar Module Building kit.

### FOR GRADES 7 AND UP, AGES 12 and up: Read 3 books. Reporting begins Tuesday, July 2.

Two graphic novels count as one book. E-Books & audio books also count. Report on your book and receive a raffle ticket for four tickets to Monkey C Monkey Do!

\*Research shows that children who do not read during vacation will *slide* behind their reading peers.

\*\*The date of the Summer Reading Club Celebration will be announced soon. We are working on a pool party with pizza or tacos and watermelon at the Wiscasset Recreation Center. Children age 5 and under will need an adult with them.
