Behind the Scenes: Part 2

How Your Library Works

Last month, you read about the early history of Wiscasset Public Library. You learned how some farseeing individuals came forward with their personal collections and melded them into a public library. We covered some of the history of the building in which the Library is currently situated. Now we will turn our focus on the administration of the Library. In this article you will be introduced to the Board of Corporators (BoC) and the business they conduct.

WPL has a Board of twenty-nine Corporators, a Board of nine Trustees, a Library Director, Library staff and the Friends of the Library organization. With so many individuals involved with the Library administration, it can be confusing to understand how anything gets done and who may be responsible for what roles. It is really quite simple. Each group and individual has a specific set of responsibilities and duties. When you understand what those duties are and who is responsible, the confusion is mitigated.

The Corporators hold the legal annual meeting of the BoC every January. They conduct the BoC business following a specific agenda. After the meeting is called to order, the Secretary calls the roll to assure that a quorum is present. The minutes of the meeting from the previous year are read and approved. The Treasurer is called upon to inform the BoC on the financial status of the Library's accounts. The Treasurer also offers a budget for the next year. The BoC discusses the budget and votes to accept. The next order of business is a report from the Library Director. The Director informs the Corporators on the events that have occurred at the Library over the past year. The Director also presents the relevant statistics on circulation, attendance and programs. The Nominating Committee, a subset of the BoC, makes the BoC members aware of officer positions to be filled and any other vacancies on the BoC. The Nominating Committee recommends individuals to fill those seats. This Committee also makes the BoC aware of vacant seats and positions on the Board of Trustees. A vote is held to elect proposed Corporators; then a vote is held to appoint Trustees and fill the offices of President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. When the business has been completed, the meeting is adjourned.

Immediately following the adjournment of the BoC annual meeting, the Board of Trustees will hold their first meeting of the new year. The work of the Board of Trustees will be covered in part three of this series.

Staff Picks: World War II Fiction by Janet Morgan

June 2019 marked the 75th anniversary of D-Day and the battle of Normandy. World War II has shaped the world we know for several generations now, and even young artists are inspired by the history of that time. The ongoing interest in World War II has spawned many highly-acclaimed and award-winning books on the topic. Some are novels based on real people and events. For example, *The Tattooist of Auschwitz*, *The Lilac Girls* and *With Love, Wherever You Are* are thinly-veiled accounts of real people in their struggle to survive. *Code Talkers* retells the true story of Navajo speakers who did their part towards the war effort. There are a number of books that let us see how life was from the side of the "enemy." *The Good at Heart* and *The Boy in the Striped Pajamas* are works of fiction that relate how Germans coped with the war... or perhaps did not. 
Book Share (reader's choice)
