I am happy to announce that expanded borrowing options are now available. The Inter-Library Loan service has been restored. If your preferred title is not available at WPL, search the MILS library catalog for your reading choices. You can also go to MaineCat to search all participating libraries in the state. Sign in with your last name and library card 14-digit barcode number to submit your requests. The system will email you when your item(s) are ready for pickup at WPL.

The Maine Reciprocal Borrowing program is also back in action. If you would like to go to another area library to borrow material, please call first to ensure that the library is open and has restored services for Reciprocal patrons. You will find a full listing of <u>Reciprocal Borrowing libraries</u>, along with the library contact information, on the <u>Maine State Library</u> website.

I got an overdue notice! What is going on?

You returned your books then received an "OVERDUE" notice. Why?!

We are sorry if this has happened to you. The erroneous overdue notices are an unavoidable consequence of our COVID-19 safety precautions. We do not check in returned items until the items have been quarantined for four days. Please be patient and just ignore the notice. For your information:

- Wiscasset Public Library <u>does not</u> charge late fees.
- The notices are designed to accommodate all libraries. They look like a bill but are not a bill.
- WPL only sends a bill if a patron has lost or damaged an item and we have to replace it; or, if a patron borrows a brand new best-seller item with high demand, it is more than a month overdue and we have to replace it. The WPL <u>overdue policy</u> is on our website.
- The notices are computer-generated and cannot be shut off without shutting down all notices. That includes your notice that your reserved items are ready for you.
- Books returned to the quarantine cart are not checked in until the quarantine period is over. This protects staff from handling contaminated items and keeps items from showing up as available in the card catalog.
- Returned items are held in quarantine for four full days before they are checked in and shelved.
- You can place a hold on items that are in quarantine and you will be notified when the items become available. This practice saves you a wasted trip to WPL for an item that is still in quarantine.
- If you receive a second overdue notice, contact us and we will check the carts for your items.

The Library staff is dedicated to an extensive set of practices that keep the Library building and its collections as safe as possible for public use. We appreciate your support, patience and understanding in this very difficult time. Wiscasset Public Library patrons are the best!

COVID-19 Safety Precautions

We are continually monitoring the COVID-19 news and participating in weekly meetings led by Maine State Library on this topic. Our top priority at this time is to provide library services to the public in a safe manner. Our current policies and procedures are working well and will be left in place for the remainder of the summer:

- 10 patrons allowed in building at a time
- Face covering is required to be worn in the building (bring your own)
- Curbside delivery is available for those who can't wear a facial covering
- Use hand sanitizer immediately upon entering the building, even if you are wearing gloves
- Patrons must be symptom free of any illness for the last two weeks

- 30-minute time limit
- Place items that you touched and aren't checking out on one of the tables, so they can be added to the quarantine cart. Do not return items to shelves.
- No public bathrooms
- No meetings
- The Used Book Room is closed until further notice
- Patrons who are non-compliant will be asked to leave the building

The Library is committed to keeping everyone safe and to maintaining a safe environment that will allow us to stay open. We can do this together!


