COVID-19 Safety Precautions

We are continually monitoring the COVID-19 news. Our top priority at this time is to provide library services to the public in the safest manner. Our current policies are:

- 10 patrons allowed in building at a time
- A face mask is required to be worn in the building (bring your own). A face shield is <u>not</u> an approved mask alternative at this time.
- Curbside delivery is available for those who can't wear a face mask
- Use hand sanitizer immediately upon entering the building, even if you are wearing gloves
- Patrons must be symptom free of any illness for the last two weeks
- 30-minute time limit
- Place items that you touched and aren't checking out on one of the tables, so they can be added to the quarantine cart. Do not return items to shelves.
- No public bathrooms
- No meetings
- The Used Book Room is closed until further notice
- Patrons who are non-compliant will be asked to leave the building

The Library is committed to keeping everyone healthy and to maintaining a safe environment that will allow us to stay open. We can do this together!

Keeping Maine Healthy

The State of Maine has expanded its COVID-19 testing capacity. Under a <u>standing order (PDF)</u>, anyone in Maine over the age of 12 months who feels they need a test for COVID-19 may get a test at participating sites, without the need for a test order from their own health care provider. However, people are encouraged to contact their provider with concerns about COVID-19. A number of sites in Maine are providing COVID-19 tests, with or without symptoms, as described in the standing order. For more information, see the "Keep Maine Healthy" website.

Staff Picks: New & Noteworthy



Home Now: How 6,000 Refugees Transformed an American Town by Cynthia Anderson

Cynthia Anderson, the author of *Home Now*, grew up near Lewiston, Maine. Now a teacher of writing at Boston University, Anderson affectingly describes the changes that have occurred in Lewiston since the introduction of 6,000 immigrants to this city

of 30,000 people. Anderson tells the story of this resilient city, offering the unfolding drama of a community's reinvention--and illustrating how Maine is directly affected by some of the defining political issues in America today.

Lewiston was a thriving mill town until the mills closed. Jobs disappeared and younger residents moved away. Then, beginning in the early 2000s, the city became home to thousands of African immigrants. It is now one of the most Muslim towns in the U.S.; about 6,000 of Lewiston's 36,000 inhabitants are refugees and asylum seekers, many of them Somali. Anderson does an admirable job presenting the challenges an existing community and its immigrants face as they learn to live together and build a new community. Anderson takes the reader into the lives of both immigrants and lifelong Mainers. You will meet a single Muslim mom, an anti-Islamist activist, a Congolese asylum seeker, a Somali community leader. The story of their lives is chronicled in these pages as anti-immigrant sentiment rises across the US and national realities collide with those in Lewiston.

Constant Contact

Home Now is a poignant account of America's evolving relationship with religion and race, and makes a powerful case for embracing change and for the need to be involved in assisting immigrants as they assimilate into their new environment.

Dig by A. S. King

When their rags-to-riches grandparents decide against bequeathing the family fortune to their descendants, five teens confront difficult secrets and the realities of their disadvantages before uniting in the face of a terrible choice to save the family name.

2020 Honor Books

Laura Dean Keeps Breaking Up with Me by Mariko Tamaki Freddy Riley depends on friends, a local mystic, and a relationship columnist for help in dealing with the on-again, off-again relationship with Laura Dean.

Where the World Ends by Geraldine McCaughrean

The best-selling author traces the story of eight boys who participate in an annual bird-hunting expedition on a remote island only to become stranded when nobody arrives to take them home.

Ordinary Hazards : A Memoir by Nikki Grimes

This award-winning author describes her childhood marked by a mentally ill mother, a mostly absent father, abusive



caregivers, stints in a succession of foster homes and how, from a very young

age, she discovered the magic and solace of writing in order to deal with the pain and hazards of her life.

The Beast Player by Nahoko Uehashi

When her mother is executed for the mysterious deaths of their kingdom's protective water serpents, a girl with an inherited ability to communicate with magical beasts finds her talent ensnaring her in life-threatening war plots.
