If the beauty of gardens is more to your taste, check out **The Garden Tourist's New England: A Guide to 140 Outstanding Gardens and Nurseries** by Jana Milbocker. There is a wide range of gardening styles and types covered in Milbocker's book. You do not need to be a gardener to appreciate all of the imagery within; and, you do not need to be a hiker to visit these wonderful gifts of nature.

Enjoy the fall weather and remember to visit your library to stock up on new reading material. There is nothing like a cup of tea and a great book on those inevitable cool, rainy days.

## **COVID-19 Safety Precautions**

We are continually monitoring the COVID-19 news. Our top priority at this time is to provide library services to the public in the safest manner. Our current policies are:

- 10 patrons allowed in building at a time
- A **face mask** is required to be worn in the building (bring your own). A face shield is <u>not</u> an approved mask alternative at this time.
- Curbside delivery is available for those who can't wear a face mask
- Use hand sanitizer immediately upon entering the building, even if you are wearing gloves
- · Patrons must be symptom free of any illness for the last two weeks
- 30-minute time limit
- Place items that you touched and aren't checking out on one of the tables, so they can be added to the quarantine cart. **Do not return items to shelves**.
- No public bathrooms
- No meetings
- The Used Book Room is closed until further notice
- Patrons who are non-compliant will be asked to leave the building

The Library is committed to keeping everyone healthy and to maintaining a safe environment that will allow us to stay open. We can do this together!

We will go back to online meetings this month. Group members will receive an email link to join our Zoom discussion of September's common read, **Dead Wake: The Last Crossing of the Lusitania** by Erik Larson. We hope you can join us.

An interesting theme of discussion was memoirs based on growing up amidst the struggle for independence in Africa. A recommended book is **Don't Lets Go to the Dogs Tonight: An African Childhood** by Alexandra Fuller. Another book currently being read is **The Wife's Tale: a Personal History** by Aida Edemarium.

The Detective in the Dooryard: Reflections of a Maine Cop by Tim Cotton If you read the Bangor Police Department's Facebook page, you know that detective Tim Cotton is a talented storyteller. In his first book, Cotton tells us of his experiences with people on the wrong side of the law. He also shares tales about the regular folks he encounters, people who need his help, or those who just want to share a story. His essays will remind you of the reasons that you love Maine, all related with the dry wit of a lifelong Mainer.

### I Work at a Public Library: A Collection of Crazy Stories from the Stacks by Gina Sheridan

Sheridan shares many tales of interacting with the public from her experiences at a circulation desk. These wonderful little snippets of oddities and humor are sure to entertain and amuse. From patron questions to overheard conversations and miscommunications, these strange but true vignettes are just fun to read.



## Audiobooks for Tweens, Teens and Families

Audiobooks are a one of the many resources available through your library. Why listen to a book? There are so many reasons!
