# **COVID-19 Safety Precautions**

We are continually monitoring the COVID-19 news. Our top priority at this time is to provide library services to the public in the safest manner. Our current policies are:

- 10 patrons allowed in building at a time
- A face mask is required to be worn in the building (bring your own). A
  face shield is <u>not</u> an approved mask alternative at this time.
- Curbside delivery is available for those who can't wear a face mask
- Use hand sanitizer immediately upon entering the building, even if you are wearing gloves
- Patrons must be symptom free of any illness for the last two weeks
- 30-minute time limit
- Place items that you touched and aren't checking out on one of the tables, so they can be added to the quarantine cart. Do not return items to shelves.
- No public bathrooms
- No meetings
- Used Book Room sales are discontinued until further notice
- Patrons who are non-compliant will be asked to leave the building

The Library is committed to keeping everyone healthy and to maintaining a safe environment that will allow us to stay open. We can do this together!

Happy New Year! Last month, the Book Group met via Zoom to discuss News of the World by Paulette Jiles. The story takes place shortly after the Civil War, mostly in small Texas towns. The main character travels from town to town supporting himself as a professional reader. He charges a small fee to attendees to hear him read the news of the world from various newspapers. At one stop, he is asked to deliver a white girl, who had been captured by an Indian tribe and recently rescued, to family members unaware of her imminent arrival. Cultural clashes ensue between him and the girl and between the girl and her relatives.

Attendees had strong opinions about the story, ranging from "thoroughly enjoyed it" to "not a story I would recommend" and everything in between. Following this discussion, members recommended additional titles for readers' consideration.



# **Book Review: The Lost Prayers of Ricky Graves**



The faces we show to the world and our true selves can be at odds with each other. Ceding our self-deception to harsh reality can be devastating. First-time novelist James Han Mattson examines the relationships between our real lives and our social media feeds in *The Lost Prayers of Ricky Graves*, a moving look at the intersections of rural queerness, the internet, and forgiveness.

In these narratives, interspersed with e-mails, gay chat-room exchanges, and other fragments of a youth laid bare in the age of social media, is the mystery of a life in all its glory: despair and regret, humor and wonder, courage and connection. A heartbroken and humiliated Ricky Graves took the life of a classmate and himself. Five months later, the sleepy community is still in shock and mourning. Ricky's sister, Alyssa, returns to confront her shattered, withdrawn mother and her guilt over the brother she left adrift. Mark McVitry, the lone survivor of the deadly outburst sparked by his own cruelty, is tormented by visions of Ricky's vengeful spirit. Ricky's surrogate older brother, Corky Meeks, grapples with doubts about the fragile boy he tried to protect but may have doomed instead. And Jeremy Little, who inadvertently became Ricky's long-distance Internet crush despite never having met, seeks to atone for failing to hear his friend's cries for help.

Shock and grief have given way to soul searching for those closest to the tormented killer, as they're forced to confront their broken dreams, buried desires, and missed opportunities. Seeking meaning and redemption, Ricky's loved ones find a common purpose: learning to trust their feelings, fighting for real intimacy in a world grown selfish and insincere, and fearlessly embracing all that matters most, before it's gone from their lives.

museum pass. A library card is the best deal in town.


