




There has been a murder in the affluent New England suburb of Emerson, Mass. The investigation is focused on three local teens.

## New Adult Non-Fiction: The Bill of Obligations


What does it mean to be a citizen of the United States? Are there requirements? Responsibilities? In his new book, *The Bill of Obligations*, Richard Haass argues that we must re-envision citizenship if American democracy is to survive.



The United States faces dangerous threats from other countries, terrorists, climate change, and future pandemics. The greatest peril to the country, however, comes not from abroad but from within, from none other than ourselves. Are we prepared to do what is necessary and work together to save our democracy? Can we citizens place obligations on the same footing as rights? Haass offers his ideas for healing our divisions and safeguarding the country's future through an expert blend of civics, history, and political analysis. These obligations are not a burden but rather commitments that we make to fellow citizens and to the government to uphold democracy and counter the growing apathy, anger, selfishness, division, disinformation, and violence that threaten us all.

As Richard Haass states, "We get the government and the country we deserve. Getting the one we need, however, is up to us." The Bill of Obligations gives citizens across the political spectrum a plan of action to achieve it.

## New in Large Print: *Tracers in the Dark*



This sounds like a new bestselling thriller... crime lords, international law enforcement, and cryptocurrency, in a cat-and-mouse tale of technological one-upmanship. Greenberg's *Tracers in the Dark: The Global Hunt for the Crime Lords of Cryptocurrency* reveals a dark economy that has been spreading worldwide for more than a decade.

These digital black markets operate more freely--whether in drug dealing, money laundering, or human trafficking--than their analog counterparts could have dreamed of doing. By transacting not in dollars or pounds but in currencies with anonymous ledgers, overseen by no government, beholden to no bankers, these black marketeers have sought to rob law enforcement of their chief method of cracking down on illicit finance: following the money.

Utterly of our time, filled with canny maneuvering and shocking twists, this book answers a provocative question: How would some of the world's most brazen criminals behave if they were sure they could never get caught?








I was heavily involved in our PTO and chaired several fundraising events each year. I also helped with marketing for the school as a whole and my program in particular. I enjoy working in teams, and love seeing how different people bring their unique talents to different projects.

I am passionate about literacy in young children and am delighted to volunteer each week at the WPL Children's Room Story Time. Being able to use my preschool teaching skills in a new way has been a delight.

My first experience working with the Friends was at the Children's Christmas Sale. I honestly didn't know very much about WPL at that time, or about the Friends group at all. I received an email asking for someone to chair the event. I was looking for a way to support the community and I knew that it was something I could do. I was so impressed with how committed everyone was to the Library and to the children in our community. I felt like I had found "my group," and I wanted to become a member so I could stay involved.

In 2023, the Friends are funding the circulation software that provides Interlibrary Loans, CloudLibrary, etc. We also provide funding for Children's and Young Adult Programs including Summer Reading. These are just a few examples of the library resources that are available thanks to the Friends.

As I step into the role of President of the Friends, I look forward to working with everyone on existing fundraising events, and I hope to help brainstorm other fundraisers for the future. I also hope to bring our presence into the greater community through simple outreach programs, and more consistent communication of all that the library has to offer. The addition of our new Communications Chair is going to be a great asset to that cause.

I want to say thank you to everyone for this opportunity. I appreciate your patience as I get up to speed, and most importantly, your passion for our library and all those it serves.
