

By Hands Now Known is an in-depth investigation of Jim Crow-era violence, the legal apparatus that sustained it, and its enduring legacy. Renowned legal scholar Margaret A. Burnham draws a clear picture of the legal processes by which states made claims to other states for the return of their citizens, the battles over state and federal jurisdiction, and the outsize role of local sheriffs in enforcing racial hierarchy.

Burnham, director of the Northeastern University Civil Rights and Restorative Justice Project, closely examines the Jim Crow era by exploring the relationship between formal law and background legal norms in a series of harrowing cases from 1920 to 1960. Drawing on an extensive database, collected over more than a decade and exceeding 1,000 cases of racial violence, she reveals the true legal system of Jim Crow, and captures the memories of those whose stories need to be heard.

Ruth Glenn narrates her journey out of abuse in this astounding story. She was raised in an abusive household, so she was not surprised when her husband beat her. She understood and accepted the behavior. Her perspective changed when she was shot and left for dead in a carwash parking lot. She became determined to take a real stand against domestic violence. Her story of survival is a beacon of hope for others who are still in this situation. You do not have to live with abuse. You can take back your life.





Library Program: Maine's First Ship

On the evening of Wednesday, March 22, nearly every chair in the library's Fiction Room was full as guest speaker Jim Parmentier presented a program titled, "Reconstructing the 1607 Ship *Virginia.*" *The Virginia of Sagadahoc* was the first ship of any real size built by Europeans in the New World. A group of volunteers banded together to design and construct a replica. The group organized as a non-profit called Maine's First Ship, and the physical work began in 2011. Mr. Parmentier affably described the shipbuilding process and spoke about the inspiring individuals who conceived and conducted the project. This was interspersed with a bit of history of the Popham Colony of the early 1600s, birthplace of the original Virginia.

This modern Virginia was built on the banks of the Kennebec River in Bath, but the topic struck even closer to home because the ship has spent the winter docked at Wiscasset's waterfront. This relocation, which may become an annual practice, is to protect the vessel from sheets of ice that float down the Kennebec.

The ship traveled from Bath to Wiscasset using its diesel engine, but the Virginia will soon be fitted with sails – red sails. Once it receives Coast Guard certification, the Virginia will become an educational platform for visitors and for local schools. More information can be found online at mfship.org.

A New Leaf: Revitalizing the Friends of WPL Book Club

No matter your reasons for reading, your input is requested to help the Friends reestablish a regular book discussion group. Or maybe more than one. Would you want a bookish social, a literary salon, a title-sharing get-together, or something different?

Some have expressed a desire for a monthly discussion of a single book that all participants have read. Others favor a gathering in which participants summarize and recommend books they've read independently. A hybrid model might attract greater participation: on even months, the group could read and discuss an agreed-upon book; on odd months, participants could describe their own selections.
