




New Adult Fiction: The House of Lincoln

Nancy Horan's **The House of Lincoln** "is a compelling reminder that events of the past are indelibly connected to attitudes that persist today." (*Booklist*)

Fourteen-year-old Ana Ferreira is offered a job in the Lincoln household assisting Mary Lincoln with their boys and with the hosting duties borne by the wife of a rising political star. Ana bears witness to the evolution of Lincoln's views on equality and the Union and observes in full complexity his bold, polarizing wife, Mary. Ana confronts the racial prejudice she encounters daily as she watches the inner workings of the Underground Railroad, and directly experiences how slavery contradicts the promise of freedom in her adopted country.

New Nonfiction: No Ordinary Assignment

No Ordinary Assignment: A Memoir by award-winning journalist Jane Ferguson is an unflinching narrative of ambition and war—from The Troubles of Northern Ireland to the fall of Kabul.

Jane Ferguson has covered nearly every war front and humanitarian crisis of our time. Sectarian violence was not new to Ferguson. Growing up in Northern Ireland in the 1980s and '90s, The Troubles meant bomb threats and military checkpoints were common. Determined to become a journalist, without family wealth or connections, she began as a scrappy one-woman reporting team, a borrowed camera often her only equipment. Networks told her she was wrong for the job. Still, Ferguson threw herself into harm's way time and again, determined to give voice to

Ferguson's debut chronicles her unlikely journey from inquisitive child to intrepid war correspondent. With a humanity rarely seen in conflict stories, *No Ordinary Assignment* shows what it means to build an authentic career against the odds.

The Children's Room

I am often asked, "Why do teachers and libraries promote graphic novels? Do they count as 'real' reading?" I answer a resounding yes! "A graphic novel uses images—often in a comic strip style—to tell a story. With pictures or illustrations and a lot less text, graphic novels help kids practice reading." (www.understood.org; 09/29/2023) Children also learn the structure of a story and follow clues for what is coming next; in other words, reading comprehension. Children enjoy their successes, which reinforces more reading for pleasure. More reading, or practice, leads to mastery. We have several new graphic novels—stop in to see all the titles. Friends Book Club

The Friends of WPL Book Club met in mid-September to discuss *Yellowface*, a novel by R.F. Kuang that had garnered many favorable reviews upon its publication earlier this year. To borrow from one reviewer's synopsis: "Yellowface is about a young white author who steals the manuscript of her dead Asian friend, finishes it, and publishes it as her own." Any discussion of this book had to consider the irony that the author, who was born in Guangzhou, wrote this novel from the first-person perspective of a white woman. Unsurprisingly, the terms "co-opting," "attribution," and "cultural appropriation" were sprinkled liberally throughout the conversation. The book also considered the role of major publishers as gatekeepers and arbiters of which "ethnic" voices are heard and also the role of social media in creating (or crushing) star authors.

Regardless of the multi-layered irony and the sometimes-illuminating glimpse into the world of best-seller publishing, the novel itself fell flat for almost all of the WPL Book Club readers. The writing and pacing were appraised as competent, but its fatal flaw for most: the lack of a single likeable character. The protagonist (or was she her own antagonist?) was a loathsome—and largely self-loathing—young woman for whom readers found no empathy. Although one reader did express interest in "what might happen next," most members of the book club were glad to be done with this character and this book. On the plus side, the group enjoyed several Asian and Asian-inspired snacks brought by participants.



Friends of WPL Book Club meetings are held on the third Tuesday evening of each month, so the next date is **October 17**. The group will th discuss *Flags on the Bayou* by James Lee Burke. Described as an "engaging, action-packed narrative," the novel is set during the American Civil War. However, one reviewer writes, "This book isn't about the war. It's about life in

America's South during that time period and the turmoil of war on ordinary people on both sides."
