Director's Note




COVID-19 Safety Precautions

We are continually monitoring the COVID-19 news. Our top priority at this time is to provide library services to the public in the safest manner. Our current policies are:

- 10 patrons allowed in building at a time
- A **face mask** is required to be worn in the building (bring your own). A face shield is not an approved mask alternative at this time.
- Curbside delivery is available for those who can't wear a face mask
- Use hand sanitizer immediately upon entering the building, even if you are wearing gloves
- Patrons must be symptom free of any illness for the last two weeks
- 30-minute time limit
- Place items that you touched and aren't checking out on one of the tables, so they can be added to the quarantine cart. **Do not return items to shelves.**
- No public bathrooms
- No meetings
- Used Book Room sales are discontinued until further notice
- Patrons who are non-compliant will be asked to leave the building

The Library is committed to keeping everyone healthy and to maintaining a safe environment that will allow us to stay open. **We can do this together!**

Revolver by Evan I. Schwartz



Recommended: The Slough House Series



Slow Horses by Mick Herron (Slough House #1)


Slow Horses by Mick Herron is a great read, probably right up there with John Le Carre (or John Lawton and Philip Kerr at their best). The Slow Horses consist of a group of spies that have been rusticated for bad behavior from head office MI-5. They hang out in a small decrepit office building, Slough House, in the borough of

Finsbury, under their boss Jackson Lamb, an overweight, uncouth Falstaffian character. I am hooked and immediately ordered other Slough House books. This entire series is now available at the Library.

Collection Highlight: Maine in the Civil War

The Twentieth Maine by John J. Pullen

"We went into the fight with 386, all told--358 guns. Every pioneer and musician who would carry a musket went into the ranks. Even the sick and footsore, who could not keep up in the march, came up as soon as they could find their regiments, and took their places in line of battle, while it was battle, indeed." --Col. Joshua Chamberlain




The fascinating story of Joshua Chamberlain and his volunteer regiment, the Twentieth Maine, is reprinted with a new foreword by Civil War historian and UCLA professor Joan Waugh. Pullen's classic and highly acclaimed book tells how Chamberlain and his men fought at Antietam, Fredericksburg, and Chancellorsville on their way to the pivotal battle of Gettysburg. There, on July 2, 1863, at Little Round Top, they heroically saved the left flank of the Union battle line. The Twentieth Maine's remarkable story ends with the surrender of Lee's troops at Appomattox.

Pullen's book on the Twentieth Maine is considered a classic. If you want to read more on the subject, Wiscasset Public Library has many books about Maine during the Civil War. These are a few of our Civil War titles:

Rust: A Memoir of Steel and Grit
by Eliese Colette Goldbach

To ArcelorMittal Steel, Eliese is known as #6691: Utility Worker, but this was never her dream. Fresh out of college, eager to leave behind her conservative hometown and come to terms with her Christian roots, Eliese found herself applying for a job at the local steel mill. The mill is everything she was trying to escape,

but it's also her only shot at financial security in an economically devastated and forgotten part of America.

In *Rust*, Eliese brings the reader inside the belly of the mill and the middle American upbringing that brought her there in the first place. She takes a long intimate look at her Rust Belt childhood and struggles to reconcile her desire to leave without turning her back on the people she's come to love: the people she sees as the unsung backbones of our nation.

Faced with the financial promise of a steelworker's paycheck, and the very real danger of working in an environment that where a steel coil could crush you at any moment or a vat of molten iron could explode because of one drop of water, Eliese finds unexpected warmth and camaraderie among the gruff men she labors beside each day.




