Leigh Ann has more than two decades of experience educating both children and adults. She has worked in widely diverse school settings in Ohio, Virginia, New York,



and other New England states in addition to Maine — as a classroom teacher, nature educator, and more. In Alna, Leigh Anne worked as an outdoor educator at Juniper Hill School. Leigh Anne served as the PreK-grade 8 school librarian at The Children's Storefront in New York. She has also worked at Books of Wonder, a children's bookstore, and the Harvard Coop Bookstore.

Since 2003, she has tutored both adults and children in English fluency, and since 2011, tutored as a reading and writing specialist to children. At two universities, Leigh Anne created and hosted interview radio shows, highlighting vitally diverse voices. As a trained National SEED Project leader, Leigh Anne has led intensive year-long seminar programs for educators in equity and

diversity. On the Midcoast, she has led anti-racism book groups through Skidompha Library as a free community offering.

Leigh Anne holds a Dual Masters in Literacy and Education as well as a Masters in Political Science. While obtaining her second Masters, Leigh Anne served on the Advisory Board of Alumni and created events and programs in her capacity as the Head of the Student Council, building cross-division collaborations, initiating a mentoring program, and spearheading an annual community-wide showcase of teaching and learning.



For Your Entertainment: Books on CD

Great news for fans of bestselling author Louise Penny! We have the entire Chief Inspector Gamache / Three Pines series in audiobook format. Chief Inspector of the Surêté du Québec, Armand Gamache is a man of deep intellect, quiet courage, and integrity. He leads a team of investigators in Three Pines, a rural village south of Montreal rich in natural beauty and eccentric residents. In this idyllic setting, Gamache is continually challenged with baffling murders that demand the full force of his



deductive powers, as well as insight into the individuals involved. Whether taking place in a monastery, an art gallery, or the forest, each mystery reveals more layers to the people of Three Pines, as well as Inspector Gamache, his deputy Jean-Guy Beauvoir, and other series regulars.

Louise Penny chose two brilliant narrators to bring her detective to life. Ralph Cosham's delivery opens the hero's mind, heart, and soul for listeners to experience on a visceral level. Robert Bathurst, Cosham's successor after his death, captures the complex personality of the perceptive Chief Inspector, emphasizing his humanity, compassion, and wit along with his erudition. Both narrators excel at character studies of the various players in each case. If you have not been introduced to this very popular series, you are in for a real treat. These stories are best enjoyed in sequential order, so make sure you start with the first installment, *Still Life*.



In World War C: Lessons from the Covid-19 Pandemic and How to Prepare for the Next One, CNN chief medical correspondent Sanjay Gupta, MD, offers accessible, data-packed answers to our biggest questions about Covid-19: What have we learned about this pandemic and how can we prepare for — or prevent — the next one?



Dr. Gupta has had insider access to the drama's unfolding, including exclusive conversations with the world's top public health experts and behind-the-scenes scientists racing to find treatments and cures. Now he is sharing what he has learned about what happened, and also about how our world will change in the years ahead, even once we're back to "normal."

Gupta argues that we need to prepare for a new era where pandemics will be more frequent, and possibly even more deadly. As the doctor who's been holding America's hand through the crisis with compassion, clarity, and well-earned wisdom, he gives you the unvarnished story and answers critical questions. Now in Large Print: The Women's March



Twenty-five-year-old Alice Paul returns to her native New Jersey after several years on the front lines of the suffrage movement in Great Britain. She is determined to invigorate the stagnant suffrage movement in the U.S. Only a constitutional amendment will secure the vote for all. To inspire support, Alice organizes a magnificent procession down Pennsylvania Avenue in

Washington, DC, the day before the inauguration of President-elect Woodrow Wilson, a firm antisuffragist.

Joining the march is thirty-nine-year-old New Yorker Maud Malone, librarian and advocate for women's and workers' rights. The daughter of Irish immigrants, Maud has acquired a reputation, and a criminal record, for interrupting politicians' speeches with pointed questions they'd rather ignore.

Civil rights activist and journalist Ida B. Wells-Barnett resolves that women of color must also be included in the march and the proposed amendment. Born into slavery in Mississippi, Ida worries that white suffragists may exclude Black women if it serves their own interests.

Offering a fascinating look at a crucial but little-remembered moment in American history, Jennifer Chiaverini's *The Women's March* is an enthralling novel about the women's suffrage movement and three courageous women who risked their lives and liberty in the fight to win the vote.

New in YA: Within These Wicked Walls

Lauren Blackwood's thrilling debut, *Within These Wicked Walls*, ushers in an exciting new fantasy voice. Meet Andromeda, an exorcist hired to cleanse households of the evil eye. Her problem? Her mentor threw her out before she could earn her license, so she needs a patron to vouch for her.



When handsome young heir Magnus Rochester reaches out to hire her, she takes the job without question. Tackling a job that dozens have already given up on, it isn't long before she realizes the difficulties in store for her. Horrifying manifestations and the threat of death loom. Can she walk away or will she find a way to heal this curse? Fast-paced and wryly humorous, you'll stay up late to devour this "magical, Ethiopian-inspired remix of *Jane Eyre*." (*Harper's Bazaar*)
