Director's Note

Have you noticed the many ways in which libraries have changed in the last few years? I celebrated my thirtieth anniversary of working at Wiscasset Public Library in February. I have seen a multitude of changes as libraries have adapted to the current needs of the public. The days of deep quiet, hushed whispers and strict rules are gone. While you can still find those quiet corners where you can settle in for deeper reflection and concentration, the library is also a community center.



People come in to meet with others, share book titles, chat about authors and more. Advisors come to meet clients. Tutors come to meet with students. Some just come in to be around other people and enjoy the beautiful, historic building. All are welcome.

With all that has changed, what does WPL have to offer? The books, CDs, DVDs, STEM kits, and magazines are still here but you are no longer limited to the on-site resources. We offer access to the items available at libraries throughout the state. If you're looking for materials that aren't on the shelf, ask a librarian to place an interlibrary loan (ILL) request for you; or, you can go online to the card catalog and make your own request. ILLs arrive every Thursday and you will be notified by email when your items are ready to be picked up. These days, you can also use your library card at more than sixty other Maine libraries and borrow directly from them. When you are done with their items, return them in Wiscasset and we will send them back for you. Plus, you now have access to CloudLibrary where you can borrow audio and ebooks, and Comics Plus where you can borrow comic books and graphic novels. Don't forget the Digital Maine Library that holds thousands of full-text articles, magazines, newspapers, peer journals, references, and government records from reputable sources. Digital Maine's Gale databases and Niche Academy support all your research, education, and job-training needs.

Is there more? Of course! We have programs. Sign your youngsters up for the *Oceans of Possibilities* Summer Reading Club to keep them engaged in reading and attending some really great programs. There will be programs for all ages later this year. The Jane S. Tucker Archival and Genealogical Collection is open to the public. There, you'll find a wealth of information about early Wiscasset — formerly known as Pownalborough — and the surrounding

area. WPL is in the process of digitizing this collection, but it remains open for visiting in-house; just sign-in at the front desk.

Still more? Yes, there is. Did you know you can use our high-speed printer to scan documents and send them to an email address *for free*? If you need to print or fax hardcopy, we have the lowest price per page in the area. You can print from our public-access computers or your own phone or tablet. Call or visit us to learn more about any of these options. WPL's goal is to continue to serve the public and to stay relevant to your needs though the changing times. Are we missing something? Let us know how we can change and grow in order to better serve our community. Wiscasset Public Library is here for you!

Sue says, "I was recently hired as a Library Clerk. I applied for this position shortly after retiring from over 33



Book Group Recommendations

An English Murder by Cyril Hare. This 1951 mystery is touted as a "golden age classic." Set on Christmas Eve, ten people become trapped in a snowbound country mansion. When a murder occurs, it would seem fortuitous that one of the guests is a policeman. Two days later, however, there have been two more deaths and the remaining guests are no closer to solving the crimes. Cyril Hare's novel has enough twists to keep the reader wondering if the killer will be found before the survivors are rescued.






The Exiles by Christina Baker Kline. This is another excellent historical fiction novel from the author of A Piece of the World and Orphan Train. The Exiles tells the story of three young women forging new lives in 19th century Australia. Evangeline is a naive governess who is exiled to Australia for her "sins." During the treacherous voyage to England's new colony, she meets young Hazel, another casualty of British "justice." In Van Diemen's Land,

they meet Mathinna, the orphaned Aboriginal who has been adopted by the Governor. This is a fascinating view of history told from the perspective of three women facing unimaginable hardships.


New Nonfiction: The Twelve Monotasks

Would you like to be more productive, less stressed, and happier in life? Long to-do lists have taken over our lives, added unnecessary pressure and left little time to escape the all-consuming technology and the constant pressure to be doing and striving for more. Multitasking may be the norm but study after study shows that concentrating on a single task can be less stressful and may lead to better results. Thatcher Wine's *The Twelve Monotasks* will teach you to do one thing at a time, and do it well, so you can enjoy your life!

Immerse yourself in the activity and let time melt away, even if you're only out for 20 minutes. Notice how much clearer your head feels when you return home. The magic of monotasking is evidenced in more focus, less stress and better results. Patron Recommendation: Never Tell



Abrams, a New York Times bestselling author of eight novels, has recently re-released this earlier work. Mixing romance, suspense and mystery, Abrams has woven an intriguing and complex tale.

Criminal psychologist Dr. Erin Abbott wants nothing more than to live a quiet life: no danger, no intrigue - and absolutely no romance. Her plan is upended when she begins to suspect a serial killer is roaming New Orleans. Her investigation throws her straight into the arms of the only man who can help her. Journalist Gabriel Moss is eager to find his next big story—and he knows Erin is on to something huge. Abrams has woven a compelling tale of intrigue and passion. 
