The beginning of April is National Library Week (April 3-9), when we ask, "What can we do for you?" The theme for 2022 is "Connect With Your Library." Libraries exist for people. We are all about making information available and accessible; helping people find that information; and offering needed services. The best way for us to know and understand the needs of the people is for you to share your ideas. We will work with you to add services whenever we can.

I know COVID put a huge dent in our lives and became so overwhelming that it was easy to lose touch. Have you visited the library lately? I want to remind everyone of a few of the services that are already available. In addition to a wide range of reading, listening and viewing materials, WPL offers the lowest-priced printing and copying service in the area, 24/7 broadband wi-fi, public access computers during all operational hours, used book sales with extremely low prices, museum passes, free Notary service by appointment, and more.

Each year, WPL must file a report with Maine State Library quantifying our circulation statistics. 

Friends Meeting: Wednesday, May 11 Annual Friends Luncheon



The One-In-A-Million Boy by Monica Wood

I am a huge fan of Maine author Monica Wood. This may be her best book yet. "The story of your life never starts at the beginning. Don't they teach you anything at school?" says 104-year-old Ona to the 11-year-old boy who helps her out every Saturday morning. As he refills the bird feeders and tidies the shed, Ona tells him about her life, from first love to second chances. Soon she's confessing secrets she has kept hidden for decades. Suddenly, one Saturday, the boy doesn't show up. Ona starts to think he's not so special after all, but then his father arrives on her doorstep, determined to finish his son's good deed. The boy's mother is not so far behind. Ona is set to discover that the world can surprise us at any age, and that sometimes sharing a loss is the only way to find ourselves again. The Little Paris Bookshop by Nina George

Monsieur Perdu calls himself a literary apothecary. From his floating bookstore in a barge on the Seine, he prescribes novels for the hardships of life. Using his intuitive feel for the exact book a reader needs, Perdu mends broken hearts and souls. The only person he can't seem to heal through literature is himself; he's still haunted by heartbreak after his great love disappeared. She left him with only a letter, which he has never opened. After Perdu is finally tempted to read the letter, he hauls anchor and departs on a mission to the south of France, hoping to make peace with his loss and discover the end of the story. Joined by a bestselling but blocked author and a lovelorn Italian chef, Perdu travels along the country's rivers, dispensing his wisdom and his books, showing that the literary world can take the human soul on a journey to heal itself. 


