Archive Access Returns

The Jane S. Tucker Genealogical and Archival Collection reopens to the public on July 13. We know many of you are waiting to get back into the archives. The WPL archives contain a wealth of information on family histories, local architecture and Wiscasset history. While this space was closed, the importance of making this information readily available became very apparent. To that end, we are currently working to digitize the entire collection to make it available online. We have already scanned over 1,200 images and many files. This process requires us to keep the physical Archive card catalog at the front desk while we convert to digital data. For now, researchers will need to look up information in the catalogs near the front desk, make note of the files they are

interested in searching and then go upstairs to use the materials. We apologize for the added work required for research. Thank you for your patience during this process. We believe that the end benefit of finding all of this material online will make the temporary inconvenience worthwhile.




Friends Book Group Summer Vacation

The Code Breaker: Jennifer Doudna, Gene Editing, and the Future of the Human Race by Walter Isaacson is the story of the winner of the 2020 Nobel Prize in Chemistry. Jennifer Doudna and her collaborators developed CRISPR, an easy-to-use tool that can edit DNA. At heart, she is a detective, solving the mysteries of nature. She is also an ethicist, trying to determine the valid uses of her technology. Isaacson is an adept biographer, telling the tale of her quest for answers and the



science behind her work in a way that is both fascinating and very readable.



Historic New England – Visit dozens of fascinating historic properties throughout New England, including the Nickels-Sortwell House and Castle Tucker in Wiscasset, and the Bowman House in Dresden.

Portland Museum of Art – Maine's largest and oldest public art institution is currently featuring *Untitled, 2020*, exploring the response of Maine artists to this pivotal time in history.

Farnsworth Museum – Celebrating Maine's role in American art, the Farnsworth has current exhibitions including works by N.C., Andrew, and Jamie Wyeth as well as *Women of Vision*, which highlights thirteen remarkable women who have made lasting contributions to the culture of Maine.
